Saskatchewan

The population of Saskatchewan is approx 1,179,906 people. Most people live in the southern half of Saskatchewan, of which 258,000 live in the largest city, Saskatoon. Saskatchewan is the 7th largest province in terms of area and the 6th largest in terms of population with a population density of abut 2 people per square kilometer or 5 people per square mile.



Saskatchewan Specifics

Flag: Saskatchewan's official flag was adopted in 1969. It features the provincial shield of arms along with the floral emblem, the western red lily. The flag's upper half is green, representing Saskatchewan's northern forests; the lower half is gold, symbolizing the southern grain areas.

Flower: In 1941, the western red lily was chosen as the official flower of Saskatchewan. This lily grows in moist meadows and semi-wooded areas. With its flaming red blossoms, it stands out brilliantly against a natural green background. The western red lily is a protected species.

Bird: The sharp-tailed grouse is one of Saskatchewan's most popular game birds. It was selected as the provincial bird emblem in 1945.

Grass: In 2001, needle-and-thread grass was designated Saskatchewan's official grass. It's a native bunchgrass common to the dry, sandy soils of the Northern Plains. Seed stalks may reach 1.3 m (4 feet) in height and leaves are up to 30 cm (12 inches) long and very narrow. The name comes from the shape of the seeds, which are sharply pointed and have long, twisted, thread-like fibres.

Saskatchewan District Tartan: The Saskatchewan Provincial District Tartan has seven colours: gold, brown, green, red, yellow, white and black. It was registered with the Court of Lord Lyon King of Arms in Scotland in 1961.

Saskatchewan Dress Tartan: The Saskatchewan Dress Tartan was introduced in 1997 for competitive highland dancers on the occasion of the Canadian Interprovincial Highland Dancing Championships held that year in Regina. It is a variant of the Saskatchewan District Tartan, with the off-white line of the original tartan becoming the background colour of the dress version.

Tree: In 1988, the white birch was adopted as the official tree of Saskatchewan. This hardwood tree is found across the northern three-quarters of the province. Typical uses for the wood include lumber, plywood, veneer and fuel.

Mineral: Sylvite, also known as potash, is Saskatchewan's official mineral. We are the world's largest producer and exporter of potash. Our vast reserves of potash are expected to last for hundreds of years at current rates of production. Over 95 percent of the potash produced in Saskatchewan is used for fertilizer purposes.

Animal: Saskatchewan designated the white-tailed deer our official animal in 2001. Here in our more northern latitudes, the white-tailed deer tends to be larger than its southern brethren, reaching heights of more than a metre (3.5 feet) at the shoulder and weighing as much as 180 kg (400 lbs). Adults have a reddish-brown summer coat and a greyish-brown winter coat, with white underparts. The name comes from the white underside of the tail, which is raised like a flag when the deer is running or frightened.

Sport: Curling was named Saskatchewan's official sport in 2001, although many have considered it so for years. Once called the "roaring game" because of the thunderous noise made by corn brooms used to sweep rocks down the ice, curling has a rich history in the province. The fabled Richardson brothers, curling out of Regina, won four Canadian and World men's championships between 1959-63. Another extraordinary rink from Regina, the Sandra Schmirler team, won three Canadian and World women's championships in the '90s, followed by the first ever women's Olympic gold medal in curling at 1998.

Emblem: Multis E Gentibus Vires, "From Many Peoples Strength" - The provincial Coat of Arms was granted through Royal Warrant from Queen Elizabeth II in 1986. It is an augmentation of the original shield of arms adopted by Royal Warrant of King Edward VII in 1906. A crest of a beaver and crown is placed above the shield. On either side of the shield are supporters: a lion and a deer. The shield itself displays the royal lion and three gold wheat sheaves, symbolizing Saskatchewan agriculture. The base is formed of western red lilies, Saskatchewan's floral emblem.

Regina, Sask. is home to the only training academy for Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) recruits. Sask. is Canada's only province with man-made boundaries, as opposed to natural boundaries like rivers.

More than 9 million people visit Saskatchewan every year.

Estevan, Sask averages 2,530 hours of sunshine every year.

Sask. has more road surface than any other province.







Coronach Shines in the CTV Spotlight

October 3, 2011 - Kelly Elder

Most people love their chance at "15 minutes of fame" and such was true for the residents of Coronach when they heard that their hometown had been picked for the 2011 CTV fall hometown tour.

CTV Regina is in the third year of home town tours Craig Farrell, senior creative producer, said "Over the history of the tour, by the end of the week we will have both visited and broadcast the CTV news at six, live from 50 communities" He explained how the process works. "A month or more prior to the actual tour week in the spring in the fall, we do an on air promotion requesting that communities email us reasons why they like to have a tour in their community. The number of nominations always greatly exceed the actual five designated days for each tour."

Coronach was not chosen for the summer tour, but residents who made the nominations in the spring, heard from CTV in September asking if they were interested in letting their nomination stand for the newly announced fall tour. Coronach's economic development officer, Colleen Christopherson Cote received a notification shortly thereafter saying that CTV was coming to Coronach. Coronach was the first stop in a five town tour that continued over the week of September 26-30.

Christopherson-Cote worked with Craig Farrell, CTV Regina's Senior Creative Producer to come up with the agenda for the day in Coronach. Farrell talked about why CTV is taking their show on the road. "Basically, to involve people from our audience in local communities in our live broadcast process and just to come into a stronger relationship together by visiting face-to-face" said Farrell.

The STC bus pulled into Coronach around noon, escorted by the local RCMP and Shannon and Chase Martin and Jaclyn Noll on horseback. The procession was very pleased to be greeted with many welcome CTV signs in business windows as well as waves from those who were on Centre Street. The first stop was at the Touch of Class restaurant where the cast and crew enjoyed lunch. The group poured hungrily over the menu, anxious to try some small town restaurant food. Christopherson and Kelly Elder, local reporter, offered up their favourite items on the menu with many ordering up their suggestions. Following gushing reviews of their lunch, the crew headed to the Coronach Golf Club where they checked out the location for the live broadcast of the evening news to follow that day.

From there, the CTV photographer headed out to catch a video of the town and surrounding attractions, such as the mine and plant. The live broadcast crew set to work getting ready for the suppertime event and the on air personalities, cameraman and a number of support staff, boarded the bus to head for the Coronach Supercross track. A number of members of the local Supercross club met the crew at the track to fill them in on the track and give them a demonstration. Following the demo, coanchors Dan Macintosh and Danelle Boivin, along with evening weatherman Carey Smith, had a quick lesson, threw on the helmet and then took a spin on the course. A much slower spin than the boys did when warming up the track, but the TV personalities did manage to get all the way around with no mishaps. Shortly after the crew hit the track, Brandon Knudson headed out to make sure they were all making it around safe, with the rest of the boys following suit to create a somewhat amusing looking, slow moving motorcade that wound its way through the course.

Boivin enjoy the chance to get back on a dirt bike after not riding for many years. "It's so small town, Canadiana and you can't get that in a big city. It was wonderful to meet the boys and they were very kind as well. It wasn't just fun, it was great to see how the community banded together to make the creation of the track happen."

After dusting off and thanking the boys for the demo and the chance to ride the motorbikes, the crew headed for the Coronach school. Students of the school had gathered in the school gym, all clad in their intermural colors, creating a colourful welcome for the group. Macintosh and by then were invited by SRC advisor Miss Ashley Rachel to join in a number of games with the students that spurred deafening cheers that continued throughout. Boivin was impressed with the spirit of the kids! "It was so wonderful to see the kids so enthusiastic about their school, about their community, about their friends. It reminded me of home. I am from a small town, this is where I grew up really," she commented. After picking up first Place for their two person team, the coanchors headed for the Coronach Early Learning Centre for some fun with the preschoolers. Boivin, Macintosh and Smith spent some time with the youngsters in daycare painting on the floor with pudding. Some of the children shed their shoes and socks to paint with their toes, but the adults stuck to the sponges, leaves and fingerpainting. McIntosh enjoyed his time with the kids. "You know what I like about Coronach so far. It's reminded me that I'm still a kid again. How many times do you get to go dirt biking, and then you go fingerpainting and play games in the gymnasium, you know it takes you from 37 years old and it makes you feel about 11 or 12 again, it was cool!" Said Macintosh.

With a few minutes to spare, the crew decided to make an unscheduled stop at Deb's Country Kitchen to join the usual afternoon coffee break already in process. The crew weren't sure if they pulled up just as a coffee crowd were finished or if the cameras scared them off, but regardless of the empty restaurant the TV crew soon settled in for a piece of pie and a break from the action. For most of the crew they were visiting the area for the first time. Boivin was no different.

"Once you go through the Big Muddy Valley, you realize you're getting into different territory here and it's part of Saskatchewan that people don't normally associate with Saskatchewan. People think flat plains and there's so much more to Saskatchewan! "Said Boivin.

Then the next two hours were spent on the bus editing, doing voice overs, preparing balloons, doing make up and various other pre-show chores. Macintosh reflected on the afternoons activities as they prepared for the live broadcast." The one thing that I always sort of marvel about is when I am out and about is the hospitality. It is a general thing for people to say that small town folk are nice, but it really is true. You get invited into peoples businesses, peoples homes, without even a second thought. And that's some thing you could never wrap your head around until you actually go to these places and visit it. To be able to go to a community and borrow a kids bike, and rip around in the motocross track and play games at the school and get a free lunch and experience this kind of thing and find a section of Saskatchewan that isn't flat, thank goodness, it is kind of nice. It is a beautiful part of the province!" said Macintosh. "It's very welcoming."

Hundreds of people from the community of Coronach and surrounding communities began together at the Coronach Golf Course clubhouse around 5 o'clock for a free supper, supplied by the Coronach Economic Development Committee. Beef on a bun, with the beef prepared by Deb's country kitchen along with the lentil salad, coleslaw, beans and homemade desserts were enjoyed by the crowd. As the sun began to set the crew scurried to get ready the scene for live broadcasts that were part of the CTV Regina's evening news. A large group of people gathered behind Macintosh and Boivin as they delivered an overview of Coronach and conducted interviews of local reporter Kelly Elder and businesswoman and tour guide Valerie Rousseau. Macintosh also went into the crowd to talk a number of the youth. When the cameras were off, Macintosh talked about the day, "It's been a fantastic trip here, the weather couldn't have been better especially considering it's the end of September. It says exactly what small town is about....they know you, they make you feel very welcome, it's very comfortable, feels a little bit like an extended family. You get to high 5 the kids and shake hands, it's just a fantastic time."

Following the live broadcast the day was wrapped up with a Hometown Hero presentation by Boivin. An award was given to 89-year-old resident Cecil Keast. Keast was unable to attend the broadcast but George Curran accepted the award in his absence. Keast served in World War II and was a prisoner of war for over 2 1/2 years. Former resident Carla Kupper, along with her three sons Mitchell, Matthew and Michael traveled from Chaplain to spend the day in Coronach for the home town tours. "My boys and I really enjoyed CTV home town tours in Coronach, they especially love seeing themselves on TV! We miss the motocross demo so they were disappointed with that. Seeing the community gather together at the news broadcast was my favourite experience. I'm proud to say Coronach give my hometown!" said Kupper.

Many former residents, as well and friends and relatives of residents of Coronach, enjoyed watching the coverage on CTV News as well as the link on Facebook. Clair Wagner, who graduated from Coronach school in 1984 and currently lives in Vancouver said, "Thank God for Facebook or I've never seen the CTV hometown tour. Well done Coronach, it was great to see the whole town out and showing the world what a fantastic community Coronach is. I'm proud to be from there - Good Job Kelly and Val!" said Wagner. He was surprised to see the footage of the motocross track, that he didn't know existed in Coronach. "It looks like a blast!" he said. Although there was some complaints of things that were missed in the footage that was shown, most agree that the spotlight on Coronach was a good one. "I thought it was very well done and very well organized. It was a lot of fun. I think the school planned a lot of activities that showed our spirit and any free meal is a good one! I enjoyed it!" said grade 12 student Connor Ferrie. Marilyn Christopherson agreed," It was wonderful, a lot of people showed up. Good food and a wonderful day. I watched it on TV and thought it was a great plus for our town. As a matter of fact, we are going to save it and show all of our friends in Florida."

The CTV hometown tour continued the next day in Oxbow, followed by stops in Ituna, Davidson and Kronau.

Pool exercise can boost your confidence if you are intimidated by conventional exercise routines. In the water, you are mostly submerged, so no one can see if you get the moves wrong. If you are a beginner, you can build a level of fitness that you can then carry over to feel more confident when exercising on land.

Water is naturally supportive. If you lose your footing on land, gravity will take over and you will most likely fall and injure yourself. In water there is no need to worry about falling, water will not allow you to, it will support you throughout all your exercises.

4. Increase calorie burn

Water also has greater resistance than air, which means walking in water requires more effort and ultimately burns more calories than walking on land. Expect to burn between 400 and 500 calories per hour in a water aerobics class, according to the Aquatic Exercise Association.

Being in a pool is always splashy fun. Participating in a water aerobics class not only makes you happier and healthier, it is also a great social experience where new friends are made. The forgiving water environment is effective for exercising and enjoyable. People are friendly and it's a lot more fun than swimming laps.
