Forecast again this year was sourced from a single spleen from a happy free range hog obtained from Jaime and Clint Cobler, raised near Gull Lake Saskatchewan (Southwest Saskatchewan). Several Spleens were examined, and this one was by far the most telling.

The Prognostication was completed on December 20, 2021 at my brother's house. Due to the COVID restrictions, no entertainment was present. But to ensure accuracy, some alcohol, namely aquavit, was enjoyed in the traditional Scandinavian fashion.

For a refresher course, in order to make a prediction, the spleen is divided into six equal parts, representing the months of the year from January through June. According to the tradition, you can't really do a forecast outside of this timeframe or it violates the rules. Violating Viking tradition risks not getting into Valhalla, so the charlatans that might be pretending to make similar predictions might be careful. When interpreted properly, this fat on the spleen will tell you the temperature and weather expectations for the upcoming year. Any abnormalities in the spleen, like bumps or scars, signify cold weather or a significant weather event at that time.

Last year, the spleen had very odd characteristics, and we indeed had an odd year with all the shenanigans in the USA with Donald Trump at the start of the year and with Covid in general. This years spleen is rather unremarkable, meaning that we will see a gradual return to a more normal lifestyle as we get past, or get used to, all the COVID-19 issues.

Based on the fat on this spleen, the 2022 winter and spring will be colder than what we have been used to, and we will have more precipitation than normal. One must keep in mind that this is a climate change pig so even though the temperatures show colder weather than normal, the old-timers will say that this is nothing compared to what we used to experience. It will start out with a below normal temperature in January but warm up significantly just before the middle of the month. After that, it will gradually get colder and generally remain colder until the end of April. May and June will be about normal but will have little to no precipitation. Even though it will be colder than normal, temperatures will be turbulent with drastic changes from warm periods bracketed by being very cold and with wind.

January/February

January will start off colder than usual for about the first 10 days, as the temperatures remain very cold until about January 12. After this, there will be a significant warming trend that will last for about a week, and then temperatures will gradually decrease again. Temperatures will drop each day until the end of the month, when it will warm up slightly and stay warm for a few days. Abnormally cold temperatures on January 22nd can be expected.

The cooling trend will be accompanied by light snow and will add more significant snowfall on January 26. Temps will remain cold toward the end of January and into February.

Temperatures into February will gradually improve over the month. Expect a warming trend on February 5 and 9 where snow and rain are again a possibility. There will be some snow again around February 20, which could become a blizzard, and again at the very end of the month and into the start of March. Expect cold winds with the cold weather.

March/April

March will start off with snow at the start of the month and then again mid month. There will be one or two very warm days around March 12 that will be followed by some snow in the next few days. In general, temperatures will gradually improve throughout the month, but it will be cold to colder than normal.

April will see continued improvement, with temperatures remaining below normal but not as significant as in previous months. Expect a snow event again near April 7. April will have a tendency towards average to above average temperatures, until the very end of the month when it will cool off significantly around April 27. The Spleen shows one significant snow and rain event around April 21.

May/June

At the end of April, temperatures will very rapidly change to mild and more normal. There are rain events at the start of May, around May 2 and again around the 22nd, but not much following this, until the very end of June. June will be a normal month temperature wise, but dry until the end of the month.

What do Chaplains do? Most of us probably have a reasonably good idea of the role and work that a hospital chaplain does. Rev. Emily Carr, as United Church Chaplain for the Northern Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy, explains that spiritual care is offered in many and multifaceted ways.

Chaplaincy Exists to Provide Spiritual Care - For many people, being in the hospital presents an array of spiritual challenges: fear, loneliness, confusion, changing self-image, loss of hope. •Spiritual care provides a non-anxious presence that allows people to feel and express their spiritual state, and to foster growth and strength. •Spiritual Care may use elements of a person's faith tradition, or other spiritual practices, to help them recover and build spiritual strengths such as courage, patience, hope, and acceptance.

•Chaplaincy Exists to Facilitate Communication and Advocacy - The world of the hospital is not easy to understand and even more complicated when one is sick. •In many cases, especially when decisions are required to be made by a patient or family, spiritual care providers are able to act as a bridge in communication between patient and family and hospital staff. •We help families understand what it means to end life support, and what will happen in this process. •We are able to communicate with staff when a family is ready. •We help and support patients who are choosing Medical Assistance in Dying, and are able to help them communicate their decision to their children and families. •When needed, we are able to help patients connect with resources such as social workers within the hospital or other programs and services provided in the community upon discharge.

•Chaplaincy Exists to Carry Out Rites of Passage - Hospitals or long-term-care facilities are not where most of us would choose to mark or celebrate rites of passage, but the reality is that it is a place where families find themselves at some of life's most important intersections. •The Northern Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplaincy seeks to help families honour the meaning, beauty, and dignity in their lives by providing rites of passage upon request, including baptisms, prayers for the end of life, marriage ceremonies, and celebrating important birthdays and milestones.

This work applies to the South Saskatchewan Hospital Chaplain also. Most of the work that these Chaplains do is directed to patients who normally reside in rural Saskatchewan (out of our two major cities).

Council Meeting Highlights December 14th, 2021 & January 11th, 2021

- We are pleased to report that we received 3 quotes on asbestos abatement for the Coronach Community Hall and that will now proceed. Town Council has hired Firmin Abatement Specialists Inc. for the Community Hall asbestos Abatement for \$52,090.90. Three quotes were received and Council reviewed them on January 11th, 2022. The abatement is planned to begin as soon as the contractor's schedule allows. Once this is completed, there will be a thorough building structural inspection to ensure restoration is possible, Town Councils intention is restoration if it can be completed within the Insurance coverage of \$741,000 for the building and contents. The timeline for the abatement will be 2 weeks once it starts and, once we have structural information, we will update the public on the next steps.
- We worked with our Town's Owner Engineer, Town Foreman, Town Council and 2. hired local Saskatchewan Engineering firm Wyatt Engineering for our
- Downtown Coronach renewal project under the funding from Prairies Canada of \$5,889,765 for Water and Sewer line replacement and road and sidewalk replacements in the business district. Follow the project's progress here https://townofcoronach.ca/downtown-coronach-renewal/
- Prepayment of utility bills for 2022 will be open from January 3rd to January 31st, 2022 for \$763.00 with a \$50.00 credit.
- Committee representatives were appointed December 14th, 2021 and letters have 5 been sent to the committees.
- 6. Council member indemnity rate for 2022 will continue to be \$150.00per council meeting; per committee meetings is \$65.00 up to 2 hours and \$75.00 for committee meetings over 2 hours; Day long meetings (over 5 hrs.) are \$250.00, and that the Mayor Monthly is \$250.00 per month and that mileage rates will follow the Province of Saskatchewan Rates as noted on Section: PS 601-A Travel Allowance document at the time of the quarterly indemnity payment.
- The Council voted January 11th, 2022 to make the payment of the annual \$50,000 to the Coronach Sportsplex operations and an additional \$5000.00 donation to alleviate demands of increasing costs and operational demands for 2022.

Chief Administrative Officer 2021 Report

Here are some highlights on the Town of Coronach projects and progress for 2021:

- Lowered the Mill Rate for taxes, both for Residents and businesses, by 1.5 mills and lowered the Mill Rate Factor for commercial properties by a multiplier of 0.25.
- 2. Approved new business and vacant commercial location incentive programs to be prepare for future opportunities.
- 3. We obtained funding for branding for the communities in the region for new logos, tag lines and websites for over \$200,000 in work, from part of this fund our community launched new branding and website design
- 4. Tourism Saskatchewan on a regional video for tourism in the area.
- 5. Joined a partnership with Montana's Missouri River Country to promote regional tourism and cross border opportunities.
- 6. Youth Entrepreneur program will start in 2022 as part of the Business Hub initiative with Conexus and Joe Taylor.
- 7. Old Coronach Street Festival brought nearly 1000 guests to Coronach on August 28th, and the Old Coronach Festival Team worked with Haus of Bellefleur on the incredible mural in the Visitor Centre greenspace.
- 8. "Reimagine the Reservoir" study was completed with community input and engagement sessions at the Poplar River Park that gives us guidance and directions for developing and expanding the park's amenities over the next 10 years
- Coronach Community Economic Action Team, Town Council and our partners on the R.M of Hart Butte Council, started work on several projects.
- 10. We have prepared a Highway Sign Policy and, in partnership with the R.M of Hart Butte, purchased frames for a new highway sign corridor to be installed 2022.
- 11. We completed the Water Treatment Plant upgrades for a total of \$1.46 Million dollars. (Thank you to Lee Smith and Korey Egan on their many hours of work on this project.)
- 12. The back up generator for the Sewage Lift Station, on South Avenue, was ordered in May 2021 and is funded by the Municipal Economic Enhancement Program. Cummins is experiencing long delays but have committed to the generator's arrival here before the end of January 2022.
- 13. We have been working with SaskPower on securing future water supply and SaskPower will be opening Request for Proposals on well drilling will be opened in the spring of 2022 to identify options for Well locations.
- 14. We worked with Pillar Systems Management on application for \$50,000 for an asset management program that gave the Town a capital asset management database program that will help council with short and long term planning.
- 15. We hired 16 local contractors (within 100 km of Coronach) to work for the Town of Coronach and tendered 12 projects and sold 2 tax title properties.
- We granted \$38,358 from Provincial Safe Restart money to 35 donations to businesses and organizations in the Town of Coronach and made a donation to the Old Coronach Street festival.
- 17. We had \$20,000 in Asbestos Abatement done in the Museum basement, with plans to have plumbing restored by their 2022 open date (to be tendered in January 2022).
- 18. We saved over \$14,000.00 this year by returning 6 Loraas red garbage bins and collected \$8469.00 in rebates for recycled materials by weight.
- We purchased a new sanding unit for winter sanding.
- We also purchased a Street Valve exercising unit to start work on rehabilitating street valves.
- 21. We purchased 6 Truck loads of Cold mix asphalt to start repairing streets.
- 22. In the Town of Coronach, 10 businesses improved their front facades in an effort towards improving town pride and community spirit with funding from Western Economic Diversification. We helped to paint the exterior of 2 town owned buildings that help the community (Sarcan and What Not Shoppe).
- 23. As the heart of the South Sask Ready Board and program, there will also be visible advertisements and promotion in 5 major cities across Canada in multiple locations funded by the same program as our beautification program.

The Town of Coronach is committed to asking and answering questions, listening, understanding concerns and developing mitigations. Clear, consistent and timely communication is critical in keeping all members of the community in the know throughout the project.

Engagement Results:

"Centre Street Visioning" exercise of photos of various downtown streetscapes gave visual ideas to attendees and survey participants. The top choices were the Roundabout, the On Street Dining, Trees and On Street Furnishings like benches, tables and textured sidewalks.

Parking preference for Centre Street, the angled parking option had 26 votes in favor compared to Parallel Parking & Median which had 3 votes.

Parking preference for the Neighbourhood streets (1st Street East, 1st Street West and South Avenue) the separate sidewalk from street surface with buffer of landscaping/grass between the road and sidewalk had 11 votes (2 online, 9 in-person) compared to the attached sidewalk that is beside to the street surface: 8 (7 online, 1 in-person)

Here is a sample of the Engagement session questions that will be reviewed by the Engineers and Town Staff and Town Council include:

- Lots of interest in keeping the median with angled parking if possible.
- Angled parking allows the most opportunities for businesses to have ample customer parking. Parallel parking could restrict access to businesses.
- Many participants liked the idea of a roundabout. Would like to see power to it so it can be decorated; Potential location north of Railway Avenue traffic heading up Railway Avenue to circle back; Potential location at 1 Avenue and Centre Street with a central light fixture and garden boxes. Could there be a roundabout north of the highway to make it safer to follow safe parking procedures and highlight the business area?
- Discussion of a "box" centre median. Can you keep the median with angle parking?
- Trees are great but they need to be pruned and maintained and leaves need to be dealt with; Like the idea of bringing green to Main Street;
- Drainage upgrade is needed at south end of main get all the run off.

The Next Step: Design and Council approval

The project team will review and consider all feedback received to prepare a recommended concept for Centre Street and the Neighbourhood Streets. Wyatt Engineering will review and consider the feedback collected from directly impacted stakeholders while preparing detailed design drawings, final costing and the implementation plan. The costs of this project during a period of high inflation on construction materials will impact some of the options that council will have be able to implement. The Town will share updates via social media, the project website and FAQ document and will communicate with impacted individual businesses, organizations and homeowners throughout construction.



- 4. Connect to help: Signs to consider professional help: poor sleep/oversleeping, anxiety, depression, panic attacks, difficulty concentrating, not wanting to get out of bed, excessive eating, increase in substance use, having little patience, dislike for your job, thoughts of suicide/self-harm.
- 5. Helping to end the stigma: use appropriate language, educate yourself, be kind, listen and ask, talk about it.
- 6. Listen to others with empathy and giving them the chance to be heard. Listen to yourself and your needs above all.
