5 Questions with Doug Opseth on Our Power Future - July 25, 2022

Lots of work goes into planning Saskatchewan's power system. As we plan for the next 10, 20 and 30 years, our power grid will look very different than it does today. We sat down with Doug Opseth, Director of Supply Planning, to learn more about our future.

1. What's changing?

When we first started as a power utility, all of our power came from coal. Over time, that has changed a lot. Today, our power system uses a whole range of power sources, including natural gas, wind and solar power, hydro power, power imported from neighbouring provinces and states like Alberta, Manitoba and North Dakota, biomass and coal. Over the next few years, we'll be adding more new power facilities than ever before and looking at other supply options. One of these options is nuclear power from small modular reactors (SMRs). We'll also be retiring our conventional coal plants, due to federal regulations.

2. Why now?

There are a few key reasons. As newer and cleaner ways to produce power have become available, we now have more options to create power that produce fewer or no greenhouse gas emissions. We also know that Saskatchewan's need for power is going up every year. And under federal regulations, we need to retire our conventional coal plants by 2030 — that means replacing the amount of power we now get from coal (around 28%) with other sources.

3. Can you use batteries to store energy from wind and solar?

We love the idea of battery storage — the challenge is getting one big enough to store the amount of power our system produces. To learn more about how and when we can use battery storage, we're currently running one battery pilot right now and we'll be adding another later this year.

4. What about geothermal energy?

We're also learning more about geothermal energy technology. Saskatchewan has potential for energy from geothermal technology that uses heated water from the earth's core. This supply option is one of the most expensive ways to create power, so as we plan our system, we need to make sure we're balancing a range of options.

5. When will Saskatchewan get nuclear power?

We've already been engaging with communities, individuals, stakeholders and Indigenous Rightsholders, but there is much more to come. Ultimately, we won't be making a decision about whether to build a SMR until 2029. Check out the Planning for Nuclear Power to learn more. source: www.saskpower.com

Rink Report

If you missed the news Coronach Sportsplex is fortunate enough to be receiving a new ice plant thanks to the hard work of local people and community development officer Kelsey Manske. Federal funding of \$240,000 was provided through the Canada

Community Revitalization Fund (CCRF) which is administered by Prairies Economic Development Canada (PrairiesCan). SaskPower has also contributed \$100,000 to this project and the remaining approximately \$100,000 will be provided by local support.

Since the announcement the tender was awarded to Ainsworth Inc from Saskatoon. They placed orders for materials and equipment on July 13 and are expecting most deliveries to be here the first week of October. After that it will take them 2 weeks to assemble the ice plants at their shop and another 3-4 weeks to complete the installation at the Sportsplex.

So the timeline for the opening of the rink will be pushed back a bit this season. We are looking at a projected date of November 15 and then after that we can begin to make the ice.

We understand everyone wants to get out on the ice and so we ask for your patience as the Ainsworth team and Coronach Rec Board navigate through this major upgrade to the Sportsplex. We will keep you all updated with progress!

An inspirational role model

Even at an early age, Terry Fox's dreams seemed bigger than his ability to achieve them. In Grade eight, he worked hard to make his school basket team, and, despite his small size, accomplished his task. After being diagnosed with a rare bone cancer at the age of 18, Terry again set his sights high. For one magnificent summer, an entire nation ran stride for painful stride with a young man whose desire was to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research, and in doing so, to meet the challenge of the disease that took his leg. Terry Fox did that, calling his dream the Marathon of Hope and uniting a nation around a common cause. And although the cancer he so bravely fought took his life, his legacy was just the beginning.

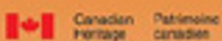

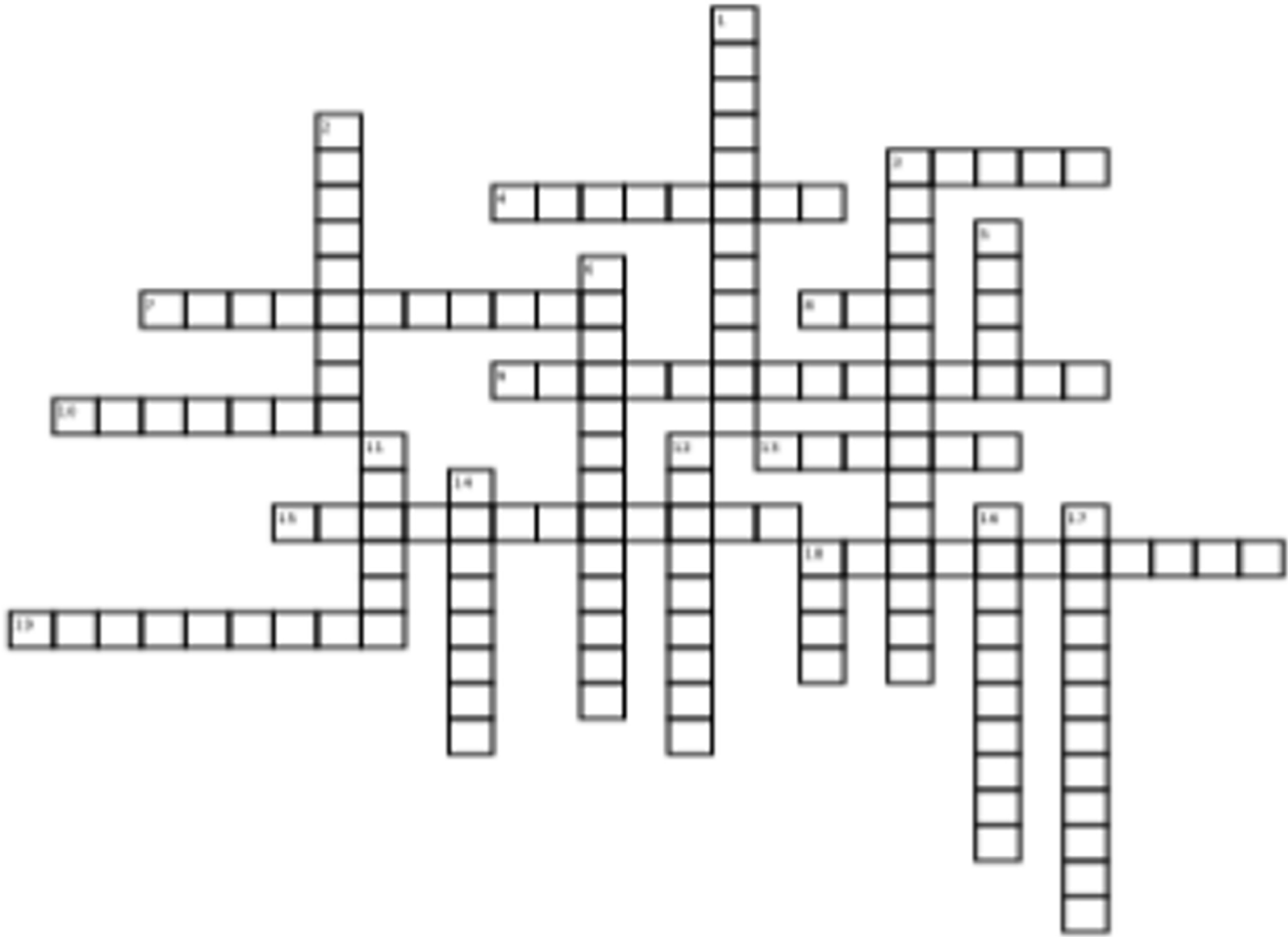

Artist Tim Nijenhuis from Hamilton, Ontario spent days out in the hot sun painting a realistic portrayal of our past and of a town legacy, Harold Siggelkow. Over the past two decades Tim has created over 100 murals, in various countries, many of them are large scale exterior works. He also create props and sets for the local film industry in Southern Ontario. Additionally he is active as a musical performer, composer, producer, and publisher.

Please meet:

TIM NIJENHUIS FROM NINEHOUSE PRODUCTIONS



Where are you from? I'm originally from Enschede, a city in the east of the Netherlands. Immigrated to Hamilton Ontario in 1996 and have lived there pretty much ever since.

What are some projects you've worked on that are the most special? In the Hamilton area I have painted about 30 outdoor large scale murals so far. A number of these murals are located on a street called Barton Street which runs through a neighborhood struggling at times to improve its atmosphere and surroundings. I'm happy to have contributed in improving this neighborhood in Hamilton.

What is the largest work of art you've created? One of the largest projects I have done was a series of murals inside a book distribution centre in Thorold Ontario. It's hard to show you one picture of it or indicate the measurements of it but I worked on it for about four months.

Who would you love to collaborate with on any sort of project, whether it be a painting, music, etc? I love collaborating with others also when I work in film and music, the talents and inside of others that I don't possess on the enrich the creative process. Working with other artist complements my own skills and has me learn from the other individuals

Any future plans we should keep our eyes open for? Currently I'm spreading my wings internationally having completed projects in Germany and the United States, I'm currently bidding on a job in Hawaii we'll see if that one materializes.

Bio on website: I pride myself in being able to create works of art, and successfully respond to clients' visions and requests. A great source of inspiration is to listen to the local community, do historic research and investigate the surrounding landscape, architecture, and culture.

My works tend to enhance the surrounding neighborhoods and bringing people together from all walks of life, social, or ethnic backgrounds. My pieces provoke thought and energy, but I always intend for these to have a positive and constructive vibe. I am inspired by, and work with Trompe l'Oeill, surrealism and 3-dimensional illusion styles.

When painting large scale exterior murals, I prefer to paint directly onto the structure. My application techniques include gravity feed spray guns, paint-rollers, and brushes. I have gained the skills and knowledge to properly prepare exterior surfaces, I use top quality water-based/acrylic/latex materials and provide protective coating to ensure proper adhesion of the paint and longevity of vibrance and quality.

Carbon Monoxide Alarms and Smoke Alarms

The Uniform Building and Accessibility Standards Act (the UBAS Act) was replaced by The Construction Codes Act (the CC Act) on January 1, 2022.

All forms, documents, orders, bylaws and permits issued under the UBAS Act remain valid under the CC Act unless these items conflict with the CC Act, in which case the provisions of the CC Act take priority.

The Building Code Regulations (the BCR) require carbon monoxide alarms and smoke alarms (or combination carbon monoxide-smoke alarms) be installed in all residential buildings in Saskatchewan, regardless of the date the building was constructed.

Enforcement will not begin until July 1, 2022, so you can have time to research, purchase and install these alarms in your residence.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) CO is an invisible, odourless, poisonous gas that is most often produced when fuel-burning appliances – like furnaces, boilers, fireplaces, stoves, clothes dryers and water heaters – malfunction. CO is also present in car exhaust.

Concentrations of CO can build up in homes, apartments or other residential buildings without you knowing it. Working CO alarms will alert you to its presence, allowing you time enough to leave the building and call 911. Without CO alarms, continued exposure to CO can lead to confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness, brain damage and death.

Carbon monoxide incidents happen more often than you think.

Between 2018 and 2020, an average of 1,200 CO incidents were reported annually to SaskEnergy.

The Saskatchewan Coroners Service recorded 16 deaths from accidental CO poisoning between 2015 and 2019.

Smoke- Smoke from residential fires spreads quickly. Since a residential fire can become life-threatening in less than two minutes, working smoke alarms can alert you and your family so you have time to escape and call 911.

The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) receives reports of all fires that occur in our province. The agency included these numbers in their latest annual report: Of the fires reported to the SPSA, 440 or 36 per cent of fires impacted residential structures. Between 2016 and 2021, the five-year average of civilian fatalities caused by fires (excluding wildfires) is just over 10 deaths a year.

Alarm Types - There are many different types of alarms available to suit your circumstances and building layout: hard-wired alarms, 10-year battery-operated alarms, and in the case of CO alarms, ones that can be plugged into your electrical socket.

Useful Life of an Alarm - CO alarms, smoke alarms and combination alarms do need to be replaced. Follow the recommended replacement cycle indicated by the manufacturer for your alarm. Alarms nearing the end of their useful life may emit a 'chirp;' or other sound every minute or so, depending on the manufacturer. The manual that came with your alarm will tell you what you can expect to hear.

If you don't remember how old your alarm is, you should replace it.

Location and Installation of Alarms All alarms should be installed, tested and replaced according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Alarms may need to be installed in additional areas in residential buildings as required by the amended Regulations depending on:

Your building's layout; The type of alarm(s) currently installed in the residence; and

The location and type of fuel-burning appliance(s) found in the building.

Building and Technical Standards developed three advisories: one for residential homeowners; one for owners of multi-unit residential buildings such as condominiums, apartments, motels and hotels; and one for care home operators. The advisories:

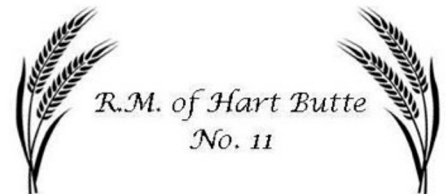

FALL INTO SEPTEMBER
