- Croatia will adopt the euro and become the 20th member state of the eurozone
- May 6 - Coronation of Charles III and Camilla in Westminster Abbey, London
- India's first crewed space flight ~ In 2023, India becomes only the fourth nation - after Russia, the US and China - to independently launch humans into space
- Canada's first supertall skyscraper - This year sees completion of a major high-rise project in Toronto, the most populous city in Canada and fourth most populous in North America. The new building is a mixed-use tower named The One and becomes the first skyscraper in Canada to exceed 300 m (984 ft) in height, which is defined as "supertall" by the Council on Tall Buildings and Urban Habitat (the CN Tower, although taller, is technically considered an observation tower).
- Driverless high-speed trains begin operating in France - In 2023, France begins rolling out high-speed, autonomous trains on its TGV network. The SNCF - France's national state-owned railway company - began testing these "drone trains" in 2019. After four years of trials with a prototype, they are now ready for commercial use.
- Venice enacts a "day-trippers" fee for visitors who come to the city for a few hours but don't stay the night. City officials have been working on the measure, designed to limit transient travelers who strain the city's fragile infrastructure, since before the Covid-19 pandemic. The fee will range from 3 to 10 euros, depending on how crowded the city is on a given day.
- January 23 and April 4: Two Tinseltown titans turn 100: Warner Brothers and Disney, of course! Both studios are planning elaborate celebrations involving their extended families of theme parks, video games, television channels and streaming services throughout the year.

MLB World Series - Boston Red Sox defeated St. Louis Cardinals by a score 6-1 in game 6

CFL Grey Cup - played in Regina between Saskatchewan Roughriders and Hamilton Tiger Cats - Roughriders won the game 45-23 against the Tiger Cats

Stanley Cup - The Western Conference playoff champion Chicago Blackhawks defeated the Eastern Conference playoff champion Boston Bruins in six games to win their fifth Stanley Cup in team history. It was the first Finals series since 2004 to be tied after two games. It was also the first Stanley Cup Finals since 1993 to feature three overtime games, including the fifth longest game in Finals history.



SNOW REMOVAL

As we approach winter, remember to clear your sidewalks for pedestrians and that snow and sanding equipment will be on the roads. Please stay two car lengths away from any snow equipment to ensure safety and the safety of our operators. The Snow removal policy has been reviewed by Town Council and approved as amended as follows:

*Full policy available at Townofcoronach.ca/Government/Bylaws and policies

1. Snow removal shall be undertaken in the following order of priority:

i. Arterial streets/access to the Health Centre, Fire Hall & Police Station, Street accessibility for Emergency entrances at South Winds Manor (access from 3rd Street West) and Pretty Valley Lodge (access from 2nd Street East).

ii. Centre Street

iii. Access to the School

iv. Residential Streets

v. Sportsplex

vi. Back Alleys

2. On Centre Street, the snow will be hauled away. Vehicles should not be parked on Centre Street, which can impede snow clearing; if a vehicle is parked before snow removal, it will be the owner's responsibility to clear the snow so that businesses may have their staff and customers park safely.

3. On residential streets, the snow will be moved to the curb area.

4. Any vehicles parked on the streets will have snow piled around them.

5. The Town will not be responsible for any driveway cleaning.

6. The Town will not clean any private parking lots.

7. Snow from private property is not to be piled on the street.

8. Clearing snow from sidewalks in residential areas is the responsibility of the property owners adjacent to the sidewalk. Snow piled from sidewalks with reasonable access will be hauled away by the town.

PETS IN WINTER

Over the long winter months, the Town Council and Staff ask dog owners to be mindful of their pets on long cold days and neighbours who may have to listen to dogs barking for long periods of time or in the early hours of the day. Please ensure your dogs are not left out of doors while you are away, and if they are known to bark, please ensure all efforts are taken to reduce their stress and barking. Check your engines for cats and kittens that like to hide in warm spaces on these cold days.

WATER PREPAYMENT

Water Prepayments will be taken from January 3rd to 31st this year. Prepayment for 2023 is \$763.00 for the minimum water and sewer amount (and this includes the Loraas recycling prepayment of \$120.00 /year). You receive a \$50.00 credit and peace of mind. Payments can be made online with Conexus or CIBC with a 5-digit account number in the Town Office by Cash, Check or Credit/Debit Card or by E-transfer with your address to coronachap@outlook.com.

As per The Municipalities Act, Section 82, 2005, c.M-36.1, s.82; 2020, c 30, s.3-21., Council resolved That the Council indemnity rate per council meeting is \$150.00; the rate per committee meeting is \$65.00 for up to 2 hours and \$75.00 for committee meetings over 2 hours; Day Meetings over 5 hrs. are \$250.00, and the mayor's monthly remuneration is \$250.00 per month, and that mileage rates will follow the Province of Saskatchewan Rates.

Lureen Travland, a longtime resident of Coronach, Saskatchewan, passed away on November 16, 2022 at the age of 93. She was predeceased by her parents, sister Helen Johnson, brother David Powley, daughter-in-law Jackie and her husband Norman (2011).

Lureen was born to Nellie and Edward Powley on a farm near Readlyn, Saskatchewan on July 16, 1929. The family later moved into Readlyn where the children attended school and the family operated the dairy. They milked the cows and bottled and delivered the milk. Lureen and her siblings delivered milk twice a day on foot.

Lureen attended Normal School and became a teacher. She taught at country schools in the Trossachs, Rockglen and Mossbank areas for five years prior to her marriage. Lureen and Norman were married in the fall of 1952. They resided on the homestead south of Coronach where they raised four children. Lureen spent many hours sewing clothes and teaching her daughters to sew. She also enjoyed knitting, needlepoint, ceramics and other handicrafts.

Norman and Lureen were Registered Seed growers with Lureen participating in the field work and doing the bookkeeping. In addition to keeping up with an active household, Lureen maintained a large vegetable garden and several extensive flowerbeds. Vegetables were preserved for the winter months and many apple pies were baked but it was the flowers that were her true passion. Dozens of annual flowers, many perennials as well as native prairie plants started from seed were grown in her yard.

Lureen belonged to the Coronach United Church and was on the local School Board for a few years. She was involved in the establishment of the Coronach District Museum, its relocation to the former hospital building and the ongoing operation of the museum.

When in their mid-seventies, Norman and Lureen moved to a new house in Coronach. A few years after Norman passed away, Lureen moved to Regina to a retirement residence and then to a private care home.

Lureen was a quiet, reserved woman who lived her life with love, honesty, and integrity. She is remembered and loved by her children Linda Engel (Marvin), Carol Hill (Rick), Glenn (Marie), Kevin (Lori), seven grandchildren, and eighteen great-grandchildren.

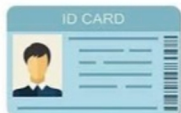

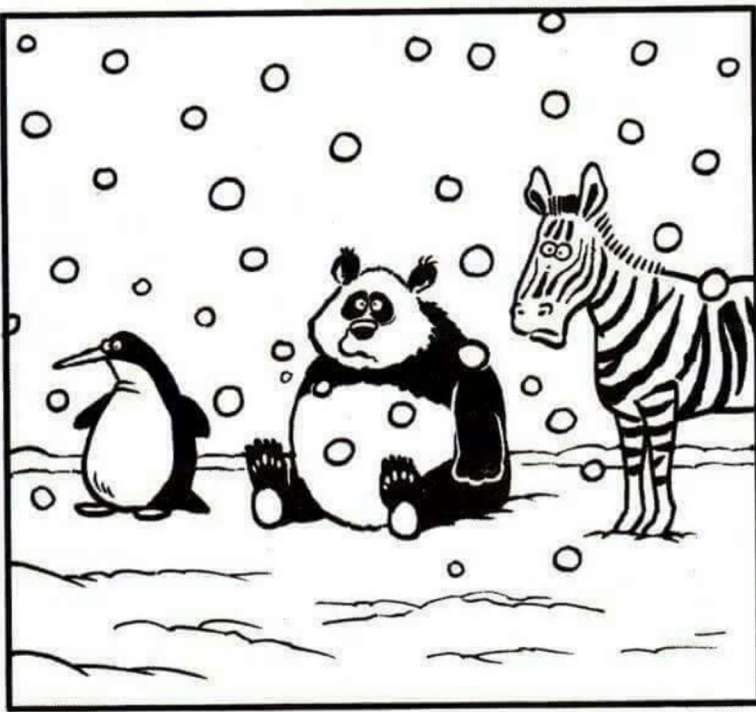

George "Scotty" Peacock

George James Peacock was born on February 21, 1945 and was the only child of George Gow Peacock and Margaret Colville Peacock (Mein). George was born in Edinburgh, Scotland and moved to Dunfermline, Fife, Scotland when he was two years old. George grew up in Dunfermline with his parents and did all his schooling there. He went to work for an underground coal mine and they apprenticed him and sent him for his post-secondary education as an electrician. Dad worked for them until he got his Journeyman status.

George met the love of his life, Janet Taylor (Jenny) at St. Ninian's Church youth group and they were married on Oct. 29, 1966. Their first daughter, Angela, was born in Dunfermline on March 19, 1967. Shortly after that they moved to Cupar, Fife where George worked for the Cults Limestone Mine. Their second daughter, Amanda, was born on Sept. 11, 1968 in Cupar. In 1969 our family moved to Ulverston, England where George worked for a company maintaining nuclear submarines.

In 1975, George got a job in Canada with the Ipsco Steel factory in Regina. He moved four weeks prior to the rest of the family and made friends with other British immigrants that came over at the same time. We have remained friends with some of those families to this day. Moving to a new country so far from the people you love, you come to rely on friends going through the same adjustments, especially during holidays and special times. For the first seven weeks we lived in Regina we stayed at the old Holiday Inn (now the Seven Oaks) until we found a home. We came with very little and times were tough to begin with as we struggled to make a new life in a new country. On Sept. 17, 1975, George David was born. The first Canadian in our small family, but Mom and Dad always made sure their Scottish heritage was not lost and never forgotten.

In 1978 George was hired on in Coronach to help with the construction of the Poplar River Power Plant. Richard Scot, their fourth child, was born on March 26, 1979 just a couple weeks prior to our move to Coronach. After the construction of the power plant, George was hired on at Shain's Electric where he worked till he got a job at the Poplar River Coal Mine in 1984. During his years as an Electrician at the mine, George became very involved in the IBEW union. He was known to be someone hard to argue with, as you may all know, and he could be quite stubborn but, he did a lot of good things for the union and we appreciate the calls and messages saying so. George enjoyed spending a lot of time on the golf course on his days off, first with his sons and then eventually with his grandkids. In the winter, he enjoyed curling and going to Merchant hockey games. He was even manager of the team for a few years.

George retired from the mine in 2013 as Electrical Planner and Supervisor. Post retirement him and Jenny enjoyed travelling especially with Jenny's youngest brother, Bill, and his wife, Elaine. George and Jenny met and knew all of their nieces and nephews in Scotland and loved them from a distance and were able to keep tabs on them all through facebook. They loved their visits with them when they were able to get back to their home country.

George was on the town council from 2003 to 2006 and became Mayor of Coronach in 2012 to 2016. During that time, he was passionate about the projects he worked on and secured several of them for the town such as upgrades to the current water plant system and paving for Hwy 18 east and west of town. He was proud of his and the council's accomplishments during his time on council.

George doted on his grandkids and great grandkids. He loved them all so much and during his months in the health center, his face always lit up with a big smile when they came to see him. He was the kind of Grandpa that got right down on the floor with the kids. He played countless hours with them and as they got older he spent one on one time with them golfing, fishing, kicking a soccer ball around, curling, mini golf and going to Rider games and so many other activities. Grandpa was game for anything when it came to the kids. We will cherish all the memories of our camping trips with him. He loved the outdoors and looked forward to camping with his family every year. His campsite was pristine and his supplies were all organized and in their right place. His picnic table had different size blocks under the legs till it was exactly level and he chopped enough wood he could've kept his neighbors fires going too. He was the first one up in the morning cooking breakfast and the smells soon had all the grandkids showing up to share the feast.

George really loved and looked forward to visits from his great grandkids although we wish he would've had more time to get to know the littlest ones. You all brought Papa so much joy and you were the sparkle in his eye and he showed that in his huge smiles every time he was with you.

In February of 2020, George had a stroke. His health declined quite rapidly after that and he was diagnosed with dementia and Parkinson's about a year ago. Then at the beginning of May of this year his health declined significantly due to an infection and after a three week stay in Shaunavon Hospital we were forced to make the difficult decision to place him in long term care. We are thankful there was a bed available in Coronach so he could be close to us. On December 6, George fell getting out of his bed and broke his hip and wrist. His decline after that was so fast, but we were thankful the nurses kept him pain free and comfortable.

George passed away on December 7 at approximately 4:45pm with his loving wife by his side. We know he's finally reunited with his son, Richard, who passed away from cancer in 1998, and with his parents and the many friends he's lost over the last few years. As heartbroken as we all are right now, we know we'll see our husband, dad, grandpa and papa again someday.

George is survived by his wife of 56 years, Jenny, daughters Angela (Kelly) Gent, and Amanda (Neil) Gent, son, George Peacock, Grandchildren Kristen (Nate) Beselaere, Brody (Brittany) Gent, Richelle Gent (Ricky Calson), Jordan Gent (Carly Schatz), Kassandra Gent, Nathan Gent, Jessica (Tanner) Rettman, Alysha (Brandon) Buckler, Peyton Gent (Nathan Chandler), Jessie (Evan) Soar, Jaime Drake (Craig Hyatt), Justin Drake (Lyndsay St-Jacques), great grandchildren Mackenzie and Cameron Beselaere, Brexty and Brayson Gent, Luna and Nova Rettman, Harper and Everly Buckler, Camden, Jaylan and Brecklan Soar, Roselda and Elijah Hagan, brother-in-laws Ian (Georgia) Taylor, Bill (Elaine) Taylor, sister-in-law Dorothy Taylor, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Conversion therapy was officially banned in Canada - Conversion therapy is now officially banned in all of Canada. The new law went into effect Friday, January 7th, and makes it illegal for anyone to provide or promote services intended to change someone's sexual orientation or gender expression.

Moderna announced the first doses of its HIV vaccine have been given to trial patients - In huge HIV/AIDS good news — Moderna announced they have officially entered Phase 1 of the clinical trial for their mRNA HIV vaccine — the first doses were administered to about 60 trial participants. Moderna worked with the International AIDS Vaccine Initiative (IAVI) on the groundbreaking vaccine.

Doctors in four Canadian provinces were approved to begin prescribing a year-long pass to national parks - To help improve the mental and/or physical health of their patients, doctors in four Canadian provinces can now prescribe a year-long pass to national parks. Parks Canada announced they are now backing Canada's "national nature prescription program" known as PaRx — or A Prescription for Nature — which looks to get people into nature for a minimum of two hours per week. With Parks Canada's backing, around 1,000 health care professionals in the Canadian provinces of British Columbia, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Manitoba can now prescribe a Parks Canada Discovery Pass — worth over \$70 — to a patient.

In a medical breakthrough, scientists identified a blood marker in babies at higher risk of SIDS - Good news! A team of Australian researchers has identified a biochemical marker in the blood that could help doctors identify newborn babies at a higher risk for sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS).

Mattel unveiled the Jane Goodall Barbie, the first in its inspiring Women Series made with recycled ocean-bound plastics. Jane Goodall is one of the world's most celebrated primatologists and conservationists. You may know her from her groundbreaking research on chimpanzees and her lifelong commitment to chimpanzee protection and animal conservation as a whole through the Jane Goodall Institute.

A new Lyme disease vaccine is now in the final phase of its clinical trial - Created by Pfizer and French drugmaker Valneva, a new vaccine for Lyme disease called VLA15 is now officially in its third and final phase of a human clinical study. If it's successful, the companies say they'll seek authorization for use in 2025 — while that's still a few years off, this is incredible progress to celebrate

The FDA approved a new drug to treat ALS that was funded by money raised in the Ice Bucket Challenge. Back in 2014, your social media feed was likely filled with people doing the Ice Bucket Challenge to raise money to fight ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. 17 million people participated in the challenge, including celebrities, athletes, and politicians, and it raised over \$115 million. A large portion of that money went to researching treatments for ALS — the first of which was just approved by the FDA.

According to the ALS Association, \$2.2 million of funds that were raised from the Ice Bucket Challenge went into funding the development and trial of the new drug, called AMX0035.




