The Town of Coronach has rescinded the Precautionary Drinking Water Advisory (PDWA), effective September 8, 2023. The water from your tap is now safe to consume without boiling. All construction work for the Town of Coronach Water and Sewer Restoration Project is now complete for the 2023 year. Please note a few street lights were removed from Centre Street as they were too close to the valves upon excavation. Street lights will be placed back in these areas in 2024. In addition, in 2024, paving and sidewalks will be completed in designated areas.

Town Council, Administration, and the Hall Board will be hosting a pot luck in the fall or winter to welcome those new to the area. Every resident is welcome to attend the potluck! Everyone is welcome! We kindly request if you plan on attending, to bring a dish from your homeland to the potluck for others to sample. More details to follow.

Did you know? Saskatchewan has some of the highest rates of elevated radon in homes and buildings in Canada. Radon is a radioactive gas that occurs naturally when uranium soil and rock decays. It is invisible, odorless, and tasteless. Radon enters enclosed spaces through any opening where the house contacts the soil, including cracks in the foundation walls and in floor slabs, gaps around service pipes, window casements, floor drains, or cavities inside walls. Scientific studies show that radon is the second-leading cause of lung cancer after smoking. Health Canada links 16 percent of lung cancer cases among Canadians to radon exposure. How do I know if I have radon in my house? The only way is to test. All homes and buildings have some radon; the question is how much? Radon test devices can be purchased from retailers, health organizations or certified professionals. Testing for a minimum of three months is considered long-term and will better represent your annual average to compare to the guideline. Dutch Elm Disease Results Please be advised some trees around Coronach were submitted to the Crop Protection Laboratory in Regina as suspected Dutch Elm was discussed. The following addresses were tested: 149 Churchill Ave, 224 King St, 115 1st Ave E, 110 1st Ave E, 240 1st St W, 7 1st Ave W, 206 1st St E, 121 1 Ave, 204 1st St W, and 48 3rd St W. All ten samples that were submitted came back negative for Dutch Elm. Negative indicates the tree is dead and not diseased. The testing period for 2023 has now ended. If more trees are discovered next year, samples can be submitted in 2024

Calling all local businesses! Coronach is still on the hunt for a couple more signs in the sign corridor. All sizes must be 4'x8'. Sign installation is \$150/sign and would be installed May-October, weather permitting. Businesses without a commercial property assessment would be charged an annual maintenance fee of \$100/sign. 1. What is the financial breakdown for the water lines and roads? So we can see what the 7 million is going towards?

Town Council answer - Water and Sewer (Undergrounds)- \$3,137,373
Paving and Sidewalks (Surfacing)- \$3,755,467
Engineering & Project Management- \$147,050
Owners Advocate- \$50,000
Total project cost of \$7,089,890

2. For several years, the town of Coronach has used a generator for the power outages. The generator is plugged into the hall and supplies the heat, lights, coffee and etc. People can go there to get warm and have a hot drink. The generator is run by the PTO of the John Deere tractor, This tractor has been broke for at least one year. What is the plan if the power go out for a long period of time? The generator should also be checked. Everything should be ready and able to work and have it hooked up for a trial run to make sure all it working.

Town Council answer - Please be advised the Tractor is not broken down and is functioning as intended. The generator is run solely by the tractor PTO. Public Works Staff have informed Office Staff that a test will be conducted prior to the winter, now that the Hall is back up and running. Town Staff usually do periodic testing to ensure equipment is functioning.

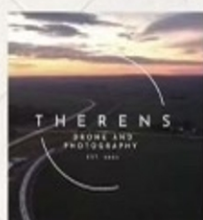

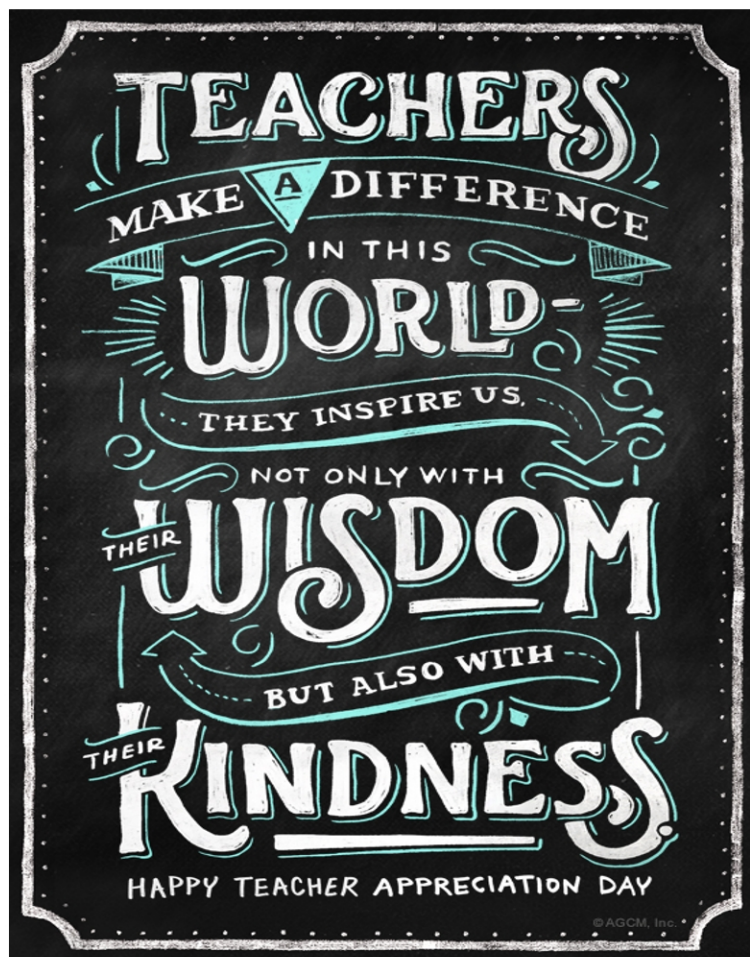

History of Austs General Store

It was built in 1928 by Hornstein & Freedman who owned it from 1928-1939

Sold to Ole & Ruby Veness: 1939-1946

Sold to Harold & Dude March: 1946-1959

Sold to Ron & Gail Aust: 1976-2023

In 80 years it has seen many changes and many people pass through its doors. We have had articles written about us in MacLeans, Western Producer, Wood River Free Press, Star Phoenix, Leader Post, Triangle News and How Rally's "Building our Future" We have been on CBC and Cowboy Country television. Because of all this free publicity we have had an influx of tourists. Our guest book shows visitors from all over the world (many who have bought souvenirs and t-shirts) But most of all the longevity of our store is due to our faithful, supportive community. We would like to thank each and everyone for being a special part of our lives for the last 50 years. ~ Gail Aust

History of owner Ronnie Aust

In 1965 Gail Nelson married Ronald Aust and it was the beginning of 47 happy years of marriage. They both worked at the store and lived up above in the living quarters. They later bought a house and lived a few blocks from the store. In 1967 they were blessed with their son, Chad and daughter, Nicole came in 1971. Chad married Shelly (Hiltz) and blessed Ronnie and Gail with 2 grandchildren, Tad and Haley. Nicole married Kim Seifert and Ronnie & Gail doubled their grand kids with the addition of Taylor and Michael.

Sadly in 2012 after a valiant battle with cancer Gail passed away. The family has continued to grow with Ronnie being a great grandpa to 7 little ones!

MacLean's magazine, 1979, "In Praise of Country Stores"

"If we don't have it, you don't need it." This sign etched in the wood above the door to Aust's General Store in Big Beaver is an invitation to cross the threshold into the turn of the century atmosphere - the days when every pioneer town looked to its general store for the staples of life. Long the landmark of Big Beaver's wide and dusty Main Street, Austs remains one of the few anachronisms in small town Saskatchewan. Well other general stores are boarded up reminders of a bygone era, Austs is a bustling emporium alive with the prairie customers who come for dry goods, hardware, food, and fellowship. Its shelves are stocked with everything from curling brooms to cowboy boots, vegetables to veterinary supplies. The sprawling store even has a boothed niche where the regulars gather to play cards, drink coffee at \$.25 a cup and talk politics. They begin trickling in at 10 AM, an hour before the mail arrives. The men huddle in one of the three small booths to play card games, such as "smear" for two bits a game and a nickel" or penny-a-point rummy. Their wives do the shopping then swap tails over coffee. "I think being able to sit down with a coffee is the thing that really helps" says the owner Ron Aust, 39. Dean Hollbrook looks up from the game of smear with Milson Harris, Russell, Ellway, and municipal Reeve Clarence Fister. "There's a certain atmosphere here," he says "You look forward to coming in and relaxing."

"I don't know if the town would survive if Aust's was to close," reflects Kay Andersen, a regular. "It's pretty well the centre of the community for miles around." Indeed Aust's has been a focal point for this hamlet of 75 residents and the surrounding areas since 1930.

The little hamlet might not live up to its "big" name, but Aust store - one of Saskatchewan's last country general stores - certainly does, offering everything from nuts and bolts to soup and saddle soap, veterinary supplies, and a hefty dose of country humor. Our motto is "If we don't have it you don't need it," says owner, Ron Aust, his family starting with his mother and father, Lena and Roy have run the grocery store since 1959. The sign above the door should really read, "If we don't have it will get it if at all possible!" his wife Gail adds. "We've got a good cross selection of everything a real farmer would want or need," Ron adds. Part of the charm of this country store is what you find tucked in the nooks and crannies between the shelves of veterinary supplies, jean jackets and cowboy boots. On the same shelf as the steel toe work boots you'll find an old brass punch, key cash register a money, jar, a coffee pot and snap shots take him by local archivist the late Ralph Rasmussen, whose photos and stories of comings and goings in Big beaver are legendary.

Sneaking peanuts behind Lisa Andersen's back with Ronnie will always be one of my favourite memories. So sad to see the end of Aust's era, but so grateful to have grown up knowing Ronnie and the impact he had on our community - Cassidy Andersen

You and Ronnie were about as sneaky as a herd of buffalo. There was even a squirrel up north at their cabin named after you!

This last chapter is pretty bittersweet. The store was more than a store. It was the hub of our little town, where you got all the latest news with your groceries, and you could commiserate with friends about the weather, the government, and whatever else needed solving! And then you headed home, feeling happier, because time spent with Ronnie just always has that effect. Thanks for it all, Aust's General Store - Lisa Andersen




