

World War I ended on the 11th month on the 11th day on the 11th hour in 1918 - 105 years ago this year.

Almost 200,000 Canadians were killed or wounded in the First World War. Another 68,000 were killed or wounded in the Second World War. More than 150 Canadians were killed in Afghanistan and at least 130 Canadian soldiers have died in peacekeeping missions.

Remembrance Day commemorates the moment armies stopped fighting and officially ended the First World War. More than this, it is an occasion to honour the sacrifices of those who have served and continue to serve the country during times of war, military conflict and in international peacekeeping activities.

A poppy should be worn on their right side, the red represents the blood of all those who gave their lives, the black represents the mourning of those who didn't have their loved ones return home and green leaf represents the grass and crops growing and future prosperity after the war destroyed so much. The leaf should be positioned at 11 o'clock to represent the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, when the war officially ended. The money raised by legions asking for donations for poppies around the world is used for helping injured and retired soldiers. It should be worn from the last day of October until November 11th, at 11: 00am. The Legion suggests it should then be placed at a cenotaph as opposed to being thrown away.

Remembrance Day (before then called Armistice Day) didn't become an official holiday until ten years later

The bugle is often played at military funerals and on Remembrance Day, to symbolize that soldiers can rest in peace. In war the bugle was used to tell soldiers it was time to return to their barracks and sleep.

Poppy Facts

- Canada adopted the poppy as the symbol for Remembrance Day in 1921.
- Poppies were the first flowers to bloom on the battlefields in Belgium and France during the First World
 War
- Poppies flourish near battlefields because the lime from rubble and debris makes for fertile soil.
- Approximately 21 million poppies are distributed across Canada every year.
- Replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to veterans.
- The Royal Canadian Legion suggests that the poppy be worn on the left lapel of a garment and as close to the heart as possible.
- Poppy seeds can remain active in the soil for 8 years.
- Poppies are featured on the back of Canadian \$20 bills
- Poppy seeds do contain opium alkaloids, meaning that if poppy seeds are ingested, in the most innocent of ways, it can give false readings during a drugs test. As a result, people travelling on planes between countries are advised not to carry poppy seeds, and in Singapore they are classified as 'prohibited goods'.
- Average seed numbers per plant can range from 10,000 to 60,000.






The Community Appearance Award recognizes the 4 murals completed by the festival throughout the community by the Old Coronach Street Festival Committee. Two murals were completed in the downtown area within the last 3 years and accompany pocket parks that were completed following the demolition of vacant buildings. In 2023, two more murals were completed at the Coronach District Museum. The 2 murals on the museum were significant to the community as the aging exterior needed a refresh. The murals were placed on 2 different sides of the building, significantly impacting the exterior appearance.

The Old Coronach Street Festival committee was awarded the Volunteer Recognition Award to recognize the individuals who organize the annual event filled with family fun, entertainment, a car show, a vendor market and more. The committee's goal is to raise enough sponsorship to cover the events expenses so any proceeds directly from the event can go into beautification projects in the community.

The committee has completed four large murals in the past 4 years, purchased 6 large self-watering pots and flowers. The community is lucky to have a group going above and beyond to help the community looks great! "We are proud of these awards and the improvements we have made to the community. We look forward to planning the next festival and working on more beautification projects," comments Courtney Setrum, Old Coronach Street Festival Committee member.





Calling all local businesses! Coronach is still on the hunt for a couple signs in the sign corridor. All sizes must be 4'x8'. Sign installation is \$150/sign and would be installed May-October, weather permitting. Businesses without a commercial property assessment would be charged an annual maintenance fee of \$100/sign. For more information please see the "Highway Sign Corridor Policy" on the Town website, https://townofcoronach.ca/wp-content/uploads/2021/07/Town-of-Coronach-Highway-Sign-Corridor-Policy-June-2021.pdf or stop by the Town Office.

Just a reminder to place kitchen grease into a pail or container and place it in your garbage bin. Please do not place grease down your drain as it can clog Town sewer lines. We thank you for your cooperation.

Please note on July 1, 2022 all buildings in Saskatchewan with sleeping rooms are required to provide early warning protection against the effects of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning, smoke and fire. The installation of CO and smoke alarms is the most effective way of accomplishing this requirement. When a building with sleeping rooms contains a fuel-burning appliance, or an attached vehicle parking garage, a CO alarms must be installed:a) inside each sleeping room; OR,b)

outside each sleeping room within 5 meters (16 feet) of each sleeping room door. (*fuel-burning appliance means boilers, furnaces, fireplaces, water heaters, stoves and other such appliances that burn hearing oil, pellets, wood, propane, natural gas, and other such fuels.) When a building contains sleeping rooms, smoke alarms must be installed: a) on each level of a building, including the level with sleeping rooms, with the smoke alarm located between the sleeping rooms and the remainder of the floor; AND, b) inside each sleeping room.

Please note meter reads from the September 30, 2023 utility billing have been delayed. Utility Bills will be processed shortly. Because of the delay, Town Council decided at their October 17, 2023 Council Meeting, to waive monthly interest for the end of October 2023 period. All residents will only be charged interest effective December 1, 2023 (if your bill is unpaid as of November 30, 2023).

Some new features! Town Admin have created water meter reading cards. If Public Works Staff are unable to read your water meter, a card will be left at your residence. Please fill out the card and return it to the Town Office or by using any other method listed on the card. This ensures actual readings are completed for your residence, which, in turn, keeps your utility bills consistent. We thank you for your cooperation in advance. Town Admin have also created Transfer Site Magnets. Magnets will be provided to all residents for easy reference of transfer site hours. These will be distributed shortly.
