

Work on our new pool is moving along as planned. The crew from Western Recreation was able to get an early start this spring because of the lack of moisture in the ground, they said this is probably the driest soil they have ever worked with. The crew was able to pour concrete in late March which gave them a good start on keeping the schedule on track. All of the cement for the pool basin has been poured and there is just one more small section of the pool deck that will be poured once the liner is installed completely. The cement has been lined with a layer of felt which will act as insulation as well as a bit of a softener, a light blue PVC membrane then gets glued and welded over the felt. The membrane installation has started but is a very slow and tedious job as there can't be any wrinkles is this liner. The new diving boards are on site and they will be the last thing to go up. The crew from CR Plumbing has also been busy moving water lines, pumps and gas lines in the mechanical room. They have also installed our new pool heater and everything is looking very professional! Hart Electric has also spent many hours helping out between replacing lights in the Mechanical room, bonding the pool and seating up to connect our new circulation pump. Claire Manske has helped us out with hauling gravel for all the ground work that's required. We are lucky to have all these amazing services right in out own little community.

With all this being said we still have lots of work to do. We are currently looking for contractors to complete the landscaping around the pool. there is some sod that needs to be installed, underground sprinklers to keep our grass green, a large amount on cement poured, and the chain link perimeter fence needs to be replaced.

To date the project has remained on budget and with the support of the federal and provincial grants, the community and the RM we are getting close to raising the money we need to complete this project.



None of this would be possible without all of the community's support. Thank you to every group, business and individual that is helping us to reach our goal. Thank you to everyone that is volunteering for events in support of the pool and helping to come up with ideas to fundraise. At this point we have about \$80,000 left to fundraise and couldn't be prouder of our community and what we've accomplished to date!



Janet Scot Peacock, known to most as Jenny, was born on May 23, 1950 to David and Jean Taylor and was the oldest of 4 children. Jenny had 3 brothers, David, Ian and Bill and was born in Inverkething, Scotland. She grew up in Dunfermline Fife Scotland. Mom and Dad met at youth group at St Ninnian's Church and Dad took her to the pictures lots on dates. Mom got a job working at a printer's when she was 15 making business cards. While at work one day Mom fainted and her coworkers asked if she was pregnant. She said no but found out soon after that she was. Mom and Dad were married in a small ceremony on Oct. 29, 1966. Their first daughter, Angela was born on March 19, 1967. Shortly after Angela was born, Mom and Dad moved to Cupar, Fife for Dad's work in a limestone mine. Their second daughter, Amanda Jane, was born on Sept 11, 1968. Our family of 4 moved to Ulverston, England in 1969 where Dad got a job maintaining nuclear submarines. Mom had the full time job of raising her two small daughters and maintaining the home. We stayed in England for a couple years then moved back to Dunfermline in Scotland where Dad got a job in the Phillip's factory. Mom was happy to be back closer to family. In 1975, Mom and Dad decided to spread their wings and look for work elsewhere in the world. Dad had two job offers, one in Canada and one in South Africa. Mom had a very real fear of snakes, so the decision was made to move to Canada. Leaving Scotland was so hard for Mom and there were lots of tears shed before and at the airport. Holidays, especially Christmas and New Years, were so hard for Mom those first years in Canada. George David Peacock was born on Sept. 17 and was the first Canadian in our little family. Even though we adapted to the Canadian way of life, Mom and Dad always made sure their Scottish heritage was never lost or

In 1979, Dad moved us to Coronach when he was hired on to help with the construction of the Sask Power Plant Mom had just had our youngest brother, Richard Scot, on March 26 and we moved in April. Mom and Dad quickly became involved in the community and were very active members of the Kinsmen and Kinette Clubs. Mom loved to help plan events and raise money for telemiracle. We settled down in our new home and quickly adapted to small town living. Mom raised us kids and made our new place a home. Mom was always up for trying new things and her and a friend bought a bunch of different chocolate molds and started making chocolates. Mom also took a cake decorating course and decorated many cakes for the community over the next years.

When Richard started school, Mom got a job cooking at Mother's Oven and at the Coronach Hotel as a cook. Then eventually got a job at the Coronach Hospital. She worked in housekeeping, laundry (which was her favorite) and as a cook

In 1996, our brother Richard, who was 17 years old at the time, was diagnosed with bone cancer and at that time the survival rate for that cancer was very low. Richard's cancer was misdiagnosed for a year and a half so by the time it was detected, the treatment and surgery being offered were very radical. Richard chose not to have the surgery and for the next two years, Mom and Dad dedicated everything they had to finding alternative treatments and our family rallied together to help in any way we could. We travelled as far as Mexico to try to find a cure, but sadly Richard didn't win his battle and passed away on July 1, 1998.


Mom retired from the hospital in 2013, she didn't like the thought of not seeing her friends at work anymore so her and a few others, that retired around the same time, formed the "Golden Girls" and the fun continued. They planned outings and get togethers and had a lot of good times.

Mom lived for her family and spending time with them all. She made sure we always spent all the holidays together. That was so important to her, and she loved Christmas. She loved everything about it and looked forward to it every year. She made homemade Christmas ornaments for all of us and baked and enjoyed shopping for gifts. She always had the grandkids over before Christmas Day to make Gingerbread houses and continued that tradition with the great grandkids. She loved the decorations and Christmas music and getting together to play games, especially cards. Our family likes to tease each other so things could get heated at times but, it was always in fun. Us kids had the same relationship with Mom, and we were always teasing and giving each other a hard time but, Mom laughed, and we had lots of laughs. We will continue to do all those things in her memory. When the great grandkids started coming, Mom was in her glory. She loved them all to pieces and loved to spoil them with treats. She was given the name Peahen, instead of great grandma, and she embraced her new name and loved hearing the kids call her that. Mom had 12 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren with another one on the way in November. Our little family of 4 that immigrated to Canada became a large close-knit family here. Our holidays can be quite boisterous and when someone brings home a new boyfriend or girlfriend it can be a little overwhelming at first. Mom loved it all and holidays are not going to be the same anymore without her. On May 16 our beautiful, caring and sweet angel left us to join her loved ones that had gone before her. She was surrounded by her family and left peacefully with us holding her hands and telling her we loved her, and it was okay to go even though we wanted to hang on to her. Mom is no longer in pain and suffering and that is what gives us peace. She was so strong in her faith, and she truly was our prayer warrior. She had her list of those she had to pray for, and she added to it all the time. She made sure she prayed for all of them before going to sleep at night and sometimes that took a long time. She would get mad if we hid things from her because how is she going to pray about it if she doesn't know. She was one of a kind and would do anything for anyone. Our hearts are broken and we're trying to figure out how to move forward without her but, she taught us the importance of family and that' s what will keep us going. We will cherish the memories and know that our Mom, Grandma and Peahen will be looking down on us all and waiting for the day we can meet again. On May 15 it was mom's 75th Birthday so to honour her we will all get together again for a meal and time together, remembering her and celebrating the amazing woman she was and will always be to us!

What is the summer solstice? This year it is Friday, June 20



The 'longest' day of the year marks the middle of summer.

This is because the tilt of the Earth's axis is most aligned with the sun, providing us with the most daylight of the year.

When it ends, the nights will began to close in as our planet rotates away from the sun.

Solstice comes from the Latin words sol, meaning Sun and sistere, meaning to come to a stop or stand still. On the day of the June solstice, the Sun reaches its northernmost position, as see

from the Earth. At that moment, its zenith does not move north or south as during most other days of the year, but it stands still at the Tropic of Cancer. It then reverses its direction and starts moving south again.






Which of your colleagues have you worked with longest? I started in Borderland School Division the same time Donna Dyck was hired here in Coronach

Hay Salvage Program

Hay can be salvaged any time during the spring or summer months. Hay must be cut at a uniform height in ditches. Bales must be placed at least eight metres away from the shoulder of the highway. As safety is the number one priority, the Ministry of Highways may remove and dispose of hay bales if locations are deemed unsafe for drivers. Those interested in hay salvage should contact their local area Ministry of Highways office to provide contact information and limits on where they are salvaging hay. This will help to avoid disputes and better coordinate with other activities that may be happening within the highway ditch, including ditch mowing by contractors and others. First Cut includes all high-traffic and some secondary provincial highways.

Key Dates for Hay Salvage

July 8: Prior to and including this day, a landowner or lessee nearest to a highway ditch has the first opportunity to cut or bale hay. Prior to July 8, permission of the adjacent landowner or lessee would be required.

After July 8: Cut and bale is a first come, first serve basis. After this day, the nearest landowner's permission is not required. Cutting and baling should not be initiated, if a mowing contractor is mowing near the area.

August 8: All hay bales must be removed from ditches or they may be removed and disposed of at the discretion of the Ministry of Highways.

As part of our ongoing reinspection program, the R.M. of Hart Butte No. 11 is scheduled for a reinspection in 2025. The purpose of this reinspection is to ensure that the physical characteristics of all properties are accurate and up to date. The data collected by SAMA appraisers will be used by the municipality for the 2026 assessment and taxation rolls.

Assessment and taxation of property in Saskatchewan is governed by The Municipalities Act. Section 194(1) states: "All property in a municipality is subject to assessment."

That said, not all assessed property is taxable. Most rural improvements (buildings) are exempt by legislation. Specifically, The Municipalities Act, Section 293(2)(e) provides an exemption for dwellings situated outside organized hamlets or designated areas if the total taxable assessment of agricultural land exceeds that of the residential improvements. This means that if the total taxable value of your agricultural land is greater than that of your residential buildings, your residential improvements may be fully exempt.

In addition, most agricultural-use buildings—such as barns, grain bins, machine sheds, and workshops—are exempt under Section 293(1)(a), unless they are used for residential or commercial purposes. All occupied residential buildings will be assessed, and any applicable exemptions will be applied by the municipality afterward, as outlined in Section 293(2)(e).

To ensure that your property is assessed accurately, we encourage your cooperation in providing access to our appraisers when they visit your property. If no one is home at the time of the visit, an exterior inspection may be conducted, and a door hanger will be left with contact information in case you have any questions.






